It is my great pleasure to address you as President of Badminton Oceania Confederation in my first year in this position. I am proud to have been elected to lead our region's badminton community, and I am excited to report on the activities that occurred in 2022.

I would firstly like to acknowledge the work and long service of Geraldine Brown in the role of President for the past 10 years. I take over this position as President, with Badminton Oceania having made great progress forward in recent years with my role to now lead us to new heights.

During the year the Executive Board met via zoom every quarter as well as an in person meeting in August, in Auckland. This meeting was combined with an excellent one-day Governance workshop delivered by an external facilitator which challenged our thinking and way of operating as a

It was pleasing to see a high turn-out of Members for our Annual General Meeting which was a hybrid of in-person (in Melbourne) and on-line.

In this past year, we have seen an impressive array of badminton events and initiatives following from the previous years of interruptive lockdowns for many of our Member Associations. 2022 has seen our badminton activities moving away from on-line meetings back to actual face-to-face delivery.

Shuttle Time remains a key programme for us. This programme continues to be an effective means of introducing badminton to children and promoting the sport in schools and communities.

Development programmes have been and will always be the cornerstone of what we do and has been one of the key focus areas for us in the past year. We have provided training and support for Coaches and Technical Officials, and we have worked with Member Associations to develop sustainable badminton programmes in their respective countries. We are committed to fostering the growth of badminton in the region and to ensuring that our players have the best possible opportunities to succeed.

Our Serve-ing Pacific initiative highlighted the many volunteers who do incredible good work for their respective Member Associations with the gift voucher concept only a small token of recognition of the huge amount of work these people do. Congratulations to all the winners. Badminton Oceania would not be where we are today if not for what you do.

On the events front, the VICTOR Oceania Individual Championships 2022 (played in Melbourne in April) was the first international tournament to be played in the region since March 2020. These Championships were followed by three Oceania Grade 3 tournaments of YONEX Sydney International, YONEX Bendigo International Officials, Volunteers, and our Staff, all of whom and VICTOR North Harbour International, and the BWF HSBC World Tour Super 300 SATHIO GROUP Australian Open. It was extremely satisfying seeing the return of international badminton to our Finally, I would like to extend my thanks to the courts.

Another highlight of the year for me personally was the inaugural Oceania Masters in Paradise hosted by Badminton Cook Islands in Rarotonga. The tournament showcased the stunning beauty for Masters (over 35 years) players to compete and socialise with one another. Playing in one of the Cook Island teams enabled me to experience a unique culture which only Pacific Islanders can deliver. The memories of this experience will forever be etched in me, I would like to extend my sincere thanks to the Badminton Cook Islands committee and volunteers for their hard work in organising this event; I look forward to the next edition in 2024.

The Northern Marianas Pacific Mini Games saw badminton included in the programme for the first time. The Games highlighted the strong competition that exists amongst our Pacific Members which will provide the driving force for their continuing development in the sport.

A new initiative for 2022 was the Trans-Tasman Challenge that saw the top under 19 players from Australia and New Zealand play a three test match series.

Our Para badminton programme has continued to grow with increased numbers from 2020 playing in the VICTOR Oceania Para Badminton Championships in Melbourne in July. We are excited to continue building on this momentum in the years to come with an international tournament to be hosted in Western Australia in 2023.

The Australia Government Aid programme: TEAM UP Inclusive Gymbad has continued to grow and achieve good outcomes. We are pleased to confirm that this programme has been extended for another 2.5 years.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Badminton World Federation for their continued

support and partnership with Badminton Oceania. Their guidance and resources have been instrumental in enabling us to achieve our goals and to promote badminton in the region. I would also like to express my gratitude to our Member Associations, Players, Coaches, Technical have contributed to the success of badminton in Oceania.

After the challenges of the past two years, it was with great delight that we could return to face-to-face engagement in 2022 while still continuing to utilise the on-line communication tools we had established and utilised during our times of no travel. We were able to stage and attend several events, attend the annual BWF Continental Confederation workshop in Kuala Lumpur, run coach education courses and finish the year with a Capacity Building workshop attended by 8 Pacific countries in Auckland, New Zealand.

By changing the host country of the Oceania Championships from New Zealand to Australia and making use of the second week set aside for Continental Championships in the BWF calendar we were able to stage the first event in the region in April since February 2020.

The Oceania Masters in Paradise; originally planned for May 2020, took place in Rarotonga in May and what a fantastic event it was. Congratulations and thank you to Badminton Cook Islands for making this initiative so successful in so many ways; the greatest challenge will be how to cater everyone who wants to play in the next edition in 2024.

One of the highlights of the year was badminton's first appearance at the Pacific Mini Games, which were staged in the Northern Mariana Islands in June. These Games presented a huge opportunity for Northern Marianas Badminton to acquire brand new equipment, upgrade their facility and to train tournament organisers, line judges and umpires to stage this significant event. Seven countries took part in the Games which included both team and individuals' competitions. I am confident that legacy of these Games will be more international tournaments being played in Saipan in future years.

We returned to Melbourne in July to stage the VICTOR Oceania Para Badminton Championships with an increased entry from 2020. The latter part of the year saw players from outside of our region return to play in international tournaments. October was a busy month with three grade 3 tournaments: YONEX Sydney International, YONEX Bendigo International and the VICTOR North Harbour International; the first time there have been two International Challenge level tournaments in one year in our region. The Crown Group Australian Open - World Tour 300, was played in Sydney in November with record spectator numbers.

The BWF continued to support many of our Members with a USD5,000 annual grant to assist them to keep badminton going and moving forward with a focus on Shuttle Time, National Championships and Capacity Building. 8 Pacific countries utilised this grant to travel to Auckland to attend a National Administrators Workshop - delivered by BWF and Badminton Oceania in partnership with the World Academy of Sport (WAoS) in December. It was immensely satisfying seeing the energy and positivity amongst

the 16 participants who are now charged with returning to their home country to bring their plans to life over the next few years.

We continued our SERVE-ING Pacific volunteer recognition programme for our Pacific members, acknowledging the huge amount of work undertaken by some key people throughout the region for the benefit of badminton in their country.

AirBadminton has begun to feature in more events particularly in the Pacific, featuring in the Cook Islands Beach Games for the second time as well as adding equipment to what is available for guests to use at one of the largest resorts in Rarotonga.

Oceania was represented at the TotalEnergies BWF Thomas and Uber Cup Finals in Bangkok by Australia in the Women's competition (Uber Cup). New Zealand were to be our representatives in the men's competition however due to several member of their team coming down with COVID just prior they were unable to field a team.

Two players from New Zealand and a team of 10 players from Australia represented the region at the Birmingham Commonwealth Games. Players from both countries made it through to five quarterfinals in the individual events, with Australian players taking some good wins against higher ranked teams but falling just short of a bronze medal in women's doubles.

Australia and Tahiti sent teams to take part in the BWF World Junior Championships in Spain, finishing 19th and 35th respectively – with Tahiti taking their first team tie win at a competition outside of Oceania.

Technical Officials development for line judges, umpires and referees continued at all levels. A notable milestone in the BWF Line Judges 2023-2026 roster is the inclusion of Christy Villaflor (Northern Marianas) and Taurea Mara (Tahiti) who are the first BWF Line Judges from the Pacific to join 8 others from Australia and New Zealand. Congratulations to Kelvin Tsui (NZL) who successfully passed his assessment to gain his BWF Umpire qualification.

Player development progressed throughout the The biggest thank you is to our Members; the people year with a New Zealand based Pasifika programme which included a Festival day and in-school satellite programmes run in partnership with Counties Manukau Badminton, with 127 participants across the programmes. This programme was supported by the Tu Manawa Active Aotearoa Fund. Cook Islands junior teams visited New Zealand for training and tournaments and two Player Development camps took place in Guam and Saipan in the lead up to Pacific Mini Games. 3 players - Remi Rossi (TAH), Shaunna Li (NZL), Edward Lau (NZL) were supported through to Badminton Europe's Centre of Excellence in Denmark to train and compete in both European and Oceania tournaments.

We were finally able to stage the BWF Level 1 Tutor Coach and BWF Level 2 Coach course, in Australia led by the BWF Coach Education expert Martin Andrew. We continued to develop new coaches through our

Foundation Course, holding the first face to face pilot course as well as Level 1 courses in both New Zealand and Australia. Two disability coach courses were held in Australia which will further assist with the development of para badminton players in the region.

2023 is looking very busy and progressive; we have received confirmation of funding from ONOC/OSFO towards a Pacific BWF Level 1 Coach Course, a Pacific Invitation u15 training camp and team competition and the Oceania Championships - junior and open, mixed team and individual events as we start the build up to Pacific Games 2027 where badminton will be on the programme.

MEMBER CAPACITY BUILDING

The BWF Member Association (MA) Grants
Programme was continued in 2022 with another
USD5,000 on offer to Members who had
completed all requirements of their previous
grants. In total 8 Members, including new
Member Wallis & Futuna received a 2022 grant
to assist them to further grow and develop
badminton with a focus on Shuttle Time, National
Championships and Capacity Building.

Members utilised their grant to travel to Auckland to attend a National Administrators Programme – delivered by BWF and Badminton Oceania in partnership with the World Academy of Sport (WAoS). Held over 4 days at Massey University, the workshop aimed to identify key goals relevant to each member association and develop a draft strategic plan and operational plan to reach the targets.







One male and one female attendee from each country was required to attend, contribute ideas and share knowledge relevant to their environment.

Across the four days, Badminton Oceania staff and John Shearer (BWF) delivered a number of sessions, covering a variety of topics including player development, strategic and operational planning, governance, finance, communications and more. Attendees utilised information and templates to develop a draft plan which they presented to the group, all were challenged to take this back home to discuss with their National Association leadership for submission of a final plan in March 2023.







CAPACITY BUILDING

GOVERNANCE - Annual General Meeting

Our AGM was held as a hybrid with some delegates present in person in Melbourne with others on-line via zoom. Following on from the new initiative introduced in 2021; prior to the meeting short video presentations aligned with our annual report were released and posted on-line, reporting on all areas of our activities. This meant that the meeting solely focused on AGM specific matters with 12 of our 17 Members attending. This meeting was momentous in that we saw a change of President with Loke

Poh Wong being voted in as President taking over from Geraldine Brown who had held this position for 10 years. The meeting expressed their gratitude to Geraldine for the work and achievements during her term. Geraldine was elected as an Executive Board member for another 4 years along with Glenn Cox with Nigel Skelt being confirmed as the Deputy President for the next 4 years.

EXECUTIVE BOARD

Executive Board quarterly meetings were held on-line via Zoom in addition to an extra meeting in February. The August meeting was face to face in Auckland, New Zealand and included a one day Governance workshop. The minutes from the meetings are available on our website.

PARTNERSHIPS

Sport for Development - Team Up, Inclusive GymBad (Papua New Guinea)



Team Up is the Australian Government's sport for development program comprising more than 30 partnerships across Asia-Pacific that are working towards three outcomes:

- 1. Sport programs attract and retain women, girls and people with a disability, as well as men and boys
- 2. Sport organisations are safe, inclusive and accessible
- 3. Australia and Asia-Pacific partners use sport to strengthen relationships and build closer collaboration

These three outcomes all contribute to Team Up's overall goal: Australia-Asia-Pacific sport partnerships support all people to realise their full potential through sport.

Our Team Up Inclusive GymBad program in Papua New Guinea is in collaboration with Oceania Gymnastics, Badminton PNG, Gymnastics PNG and Motivation Australia. Inclusive GymBad aims to remove or reduce the barriers experienced by people with a disability, particularly women and girls, to participate equally. We utilise Shuttle Time and GymAbility programs to deliver inclusive activities and encourage women and girls and people with disability to develop leadership skills. A number of these leaders have shared their stories, of how the program has made a positive impact in their lives becoming role models for their communities.

A workforce of 3 staff and 6 regular volunteer coaches made up of women and men, and people with and without a disability demonstrate to communities that the program is for everyone. A total of 752 participants, including 50% female and 13% people with disability, were involved in weekly activities during 2022.

> In May, the inclusive Gymbad program was awarded the Community Sports Initiative Award at the SP Sports Awards the annual awards for the sports sector in PNG. This recognition

had a positive impact with increased awareness of the GymBad Program through subsequent media coverage.



In December, the team in Port Moresby were able to show a delegation of visiting Australian parliamentarians the GymBad program in action as well as engaging in some good conversation around the benefits and value of the programme The team have encountered challenges of venue availability due to the pandemic and the 2022 election, however with a positive attitude and always looking for solutions staff have battled on and found ways to continue to deliver the programme whilst working around the many restrictions they have encountered.



BWF Certificate of Commendation

The BWF awarded a Certificate of Commendation to GHD who are the managing contractor for the Australian Government funded Sport for Development Programme in the Pacific.

Badminton has been very fortunate to be part of this programme since 2013, initially in Tonga and now continuing in PNG using badminton as the vehicle to develop healthier and more inclusive communities. The impact of this programme in both Tonga and PNG has been very significant and had very positive impacts on the lives of many.

Special Olympics

A new Memorandum of Understanding was signed in January; the ceremony took place on-line with our President Geraldine Brown and the President & Managing Director Special Olympics Asia Pacific Dipak Natali completing the signing formalities in front of several other key stakeholders. This MOU agrees that "both parties will enhance their mutual interests and agree upon a framework for cooperative support".

The focus is Shuttle Time activities delivered in Guam, Fiji, and Papua New Guinea with Fiji and Papua New Guinea sending players to the Special Olympics World Games in Berlin 2023.

Organisation of Sports Federations of Oceania (OSFO)

Badminton Oceania is one of 27 sports that belong to OSFO.

Julie Carrel - Secretary General, was appointed to an OSFO Governance and Leadership working group.

Following the AGM, OSFO announced a grant funding program. Badminton Oceania applied and were successful in receiving funds to support player development and coach education initiatives around the VICTOR Oceania Championships in early 2023.

Oceania National Olympic Committees (ONOC)



Badminton Oceania continues to support ONOC's flagship Oceania Sport Education program (OSEP). Our Fiji-based Regional Development Officer Kumon Tarawa has delivered OSEP courses in Fiji which have involved badminton participants.

Pacific Games Sport Council

The Pacific Games Sports Council oversees all aspects of the Pacific Games and the Pacific Mini-Games. Our aim is to become a core sport of both Games as we know how important these Games are for our Pacific members.

Badminton Oceania appreciated the support provided by the Pacific Games Council for the delivery of a successful badminton competition at the Northern Marianas Pacific Mini Games - June 2022.



VICTOR are our valued equipment and apparel partner. During the year we were able to provide many of our Members with VICTOR equipment; school sets (funded through the BWF equipment grant), AirShuttles, Rackets, shuttles and net posts. We appreciate and recognise the continued support provided to us by VICTOR.





2022 saw the return of events much to the delight of our players. COVID-19 still lingered and impacted on some tournaments whilst others were able to proceed.

Some of the events that were originally scheduled for 2022 and subsequently had to be cancelled included:

- VICTOR Oceania Junior Mixed Team Championships 2022 February
- VICTOR Oceania Junior Individual Championships 2022 February
- VICTOR Oceania Men's & Women's Team Championships 2022 February
- BARFOOT & THOMPSON New Zealand Open 2022 November
- Manawatu International (NZL) 2022 November

Despite these challenges, Badminton Oceania together with its respective member associations and hosts successfully organised several tournaments throughout the year. The VICTOR Oceania Individual Championships were postponed from February to April and other tournaments were moved to latter part of the year with the hope of having better conditions for the players to compete in. These changes resulted in the following tournaments being held:

- VICTOR Oceania Individual Championships
 April
- Oceania Masters in Paradise, Rarotonga May
- Northern Marianas Pacific Mini-Games June
- VICTOR Oceania Para Badminton Championships – July
- YONEX Sydney International October
- YONEX Bendigo International October
- VICTOR North Harbour International October
- SATHIO GROUP Australian Open November

These tournaments attracted good levels of entries including large groups of players from outside of our region. The highlight of the year was the BWF World Tour 300 SATHIO GROUP Australian Open 2022 attracting over 300 players from 22 countries who treated us to some high-quality badminton and had record numbers of spectators throughout the week.







Badminton was on the programme for the first time at the Pacific Mini-Games held in the Northern Mariana Islands. These Games were delayed a year, big kudos to the organisers that they could pull it all together and stage theses Games for our Pacific countries. We had 7 countries: Guam, New Caledonia, Northern Marianas, Solomon Islands, Tahiti, Tuvalu, Wallis & Futuna participate with Tahiti dominating the podium. Fantastic to see our newest member Wallis & Futuna win a bronze medal in the team competition and Northern Marianas win a bronze medal in the women's doubles.

The Oceania Masters in Paradise, a sport tourism event created for masters (35+ years) players to travel and play some badminton, had been planned for Rarotonga in 2020 which was postponed until May this year. It was fantastic that this event went ahead with so many positives coming from it including training and assessing umpires, the opportunity to test the indoor stadium for suitability for future international tournaments and upskilling the local organisers about running an international event. The intention is to run this event again in 2024.

Oceania Tour

The Oceania Tour is an initiative linked to our player development program which encourages players to participate in international tournaments held across the region.

MARKETING AND COMMUNICATIONS

The return of events from April 2022 onwards was welcomed and embraced by communications. With positive findings and ongoing learnings from the shifting focus during the global COVID-19 pandemic, a happy medium was found to embrace and leverage a 'new normal' which incorporated pre-during and post- COVID business, which is essentially a combination of development and events at the core of marketing and communication tactics.

The new volunteer recognition initiative (Serve-ing Pacific) picked up pace, while Northern Marianas Badminton Association joined Badminton Cook Islands online with a website. New stories in 2022 combined human-interest and event related content which assisted the ongoing distribution of monthly eNewsletters and a stronger social media presence - BOC's Facebook page enjoyed the highest engagement ever. The live streaming production was also enhanced to provide a greater viewer experience and increased YouTube subscribers.

STAKEHOLDER COMMUNICATIONS

While Head Office staff were able to return into the office, 'Zoom' continued to provide value for meetings and workshops as an effective way to connect with our members across the Pacific.

LIVE STREAMING

20

BOC's Communications Manager attended all international events in the region to oversee the communications, which included live streaming of two courts for Oceania Championships, Pacific Mini-Games and the Grade 3 International tournaments. In total, there were 350k views on BOC's YouTube Channel which grew from 800 subscriber to over 2.4k in 2022. Streaming was enhanced through commentary (from semifinals onwards), umpires were microphoned, improved visual output (video adverts, greater branding) and integration of live score onto the live stream.

SOCIAL MEDIA

THINKIFIC

The online learning platform allowed Badminton Oceania's Head Office staff to share and impart their knowledge with member associations to assist the increased capabilities relevant to organisational growth, with 18 modules available. In total there are 180 subscribers from 16 member associations (all apart from Norfolk Island) who undertook a minimum of one module.

WEBSITE

Live streaming and event related news was the most sought-after information of 2022. Following the welcomed return of events, BadmintonOceania.org accrued 178,000 website views in 2022. Facebook was the biggest source of traffic referring people to the website.

ENEWSLETTER

A monthly enewsletter was sent at the beginning of every month, alongside some event exclusive features. By the end of 2022, there had been a 20% increase in subscribers, totalling 626. The enewsletter performed well, with an average open rate of 37% which exceeds the Mail Chimp's average standards for the sports sector (24.5%).

SERVE-ING PACIFIC

BOC's volunteer recognition programme launched at the end of 2021 and continued throughout 2022, acknowledging the outstanding contributions to badminton from Pacific Member



Associations. One volunteer was awarded the prize each month (a gift card for local lunch and a certificate), while two of these winners (Sandra Low

(GUM) and Johanna Kou (NCL) went on to win the 'grandprize' (a staycation).

BRANDING

BOC's brand guidelines continued to be implemented across online and offline assets, which greatly assisted the identity of Oceania Masters in Paradise and Grade 3 events, where BOC's brand enjoyed a huge presence. Moreover, BOC assisted MAs with a variety of printed assets such as posters, social media assets and more. The ongoing use of Canva and Adobe Creator Studio enabled us to create these.

MEMBER ASSOCIATIONS

BOC continued to utilise the network of communication leads with 12 of our Pacific-based Member Associations to share information and stories, with the aims of creating human interest stories and increasing competence online with a concentration on Facebook.

BOC continued to assist Badminton Cook Islands with their website when requested, while leading the implementation and handover of the Northern Marianas Badminton Association website. Similarly, BOC set up the Wallis and Futuna Facebook page and delivered training (face-to-face and online) to enhance understanding.

The communications guide was translated to French and shared with our French speaking countries and a communications workshop was included in the National Administrator's Programme at the end of the year. The collaborations between MAs and BOC helped MA Facebook business pages to accrue a total of 1.5k new page likes across their 12 Facebook pages, a total of 50 human interest stories from MAs were written over the year.

MEDIA

A combination of human-interest and event-related stories saw the creation of over 130 news stories in 2022, distributed to an updated media distribution list when relevant. This continued to prove its value with Pacific-based media in particular. Stories were shared and repurposed for publication on a variety of online and offline platforms, including: Saipan Tribune, Marianas Variety, Cook Islands News (COK), Guam Sports Network (GUM), Team Up, InsideTheGames, BWF, OSFO, ONOC, NZOC, ACG, Tahiti Nui, Nouvelle Calédonie 1.

PARTNERSHIPS

With a continued effort to diversify revenue streams and strengthening the brand, BOC continued to develop the partnership proposal and approach prospects. Combined efforts between BOC and Badminton Cook Islands secured various sponsorships to assist the implementation of Oceania Masters in Paradise, including: Edgewater Resort and Spa, Vodafone, Rarotonga Brewery, Vonnias, Bank of Cook Islands, Federal Pacific Insurance, TAV, VICTOR, Te Kainga Wellbeing Centre. The aim is to grow our partnerships in 2023, particularly surrounding events.



In January, AirBadminton started off strong in the Cook Islands with the introduction of AirBadminton as an activity available to guests at the Edgewater Resort. This activation included resort staff and guests learning how to set-up and play AirBadminton. We donated two sets of equipment to the Resort to issue to guests as part of activities they can participate in.

Following the resort activation, Cook Islands Badminton held their first official AirBadminton competition as part of the Cook Islands Beach Games. There were 12 mixed gender teams with 5 players competing for the inaugural title of Beach Games AirBadminton Champions. This competition was a resounding success with the competition gaining a lot of local publicity resulting AirBadminton being included in the Beach Games again in 2023.

AirBadminton continued to be aligned with the Edgewater Resort as there was another activation during the Oceania Masters in Paradise event in June, with both players from the event and guests from the resort joining in for some fun games on the sand with a spectacular backdrop of the sea and palm trees.

AirBadminton continues to be an integral part in the delivery of Shuttle Time, particularly in Pacific countries where indoor facilities are lacking. AirBadminton plays a crucial role in enabling young people to access equipment and take part in activity with several setting up village and community competitions.











The Shuttle Time programme continued to perform well with a 112% increase in participation on 2021, up an all-time high of 89,981 participants. Very encouraging and positive to see so many young people across the region experiencing

badminton. Workforce training continued with Tutor courses taking place in New Zealand, Guam, and Fiji.

Oceania also leads the way in delivery of the Youth Leadership workshop globally, and Teacher courses continuing to be the staple of Shuttle Time which is

encouraging for the continued sustainability of the programme. Stories of personnel from across the region were highlighted in BWF's

monthly Humans of Shuttle Time campaign.

Badminton continued a close relationship with Special Olympics through the Shuttle Time program with activities delivered in a number of countries. Fiji and Papua New Guinea are preparing to send athletes and coaches to the Special Olympics World Games in Germany in 2023.

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

2022 saw the implementation of a number of new Player Development programmes. One key grass roots programme was the Pasifika badminton programme in partnership with a local badminton Association in Auckland, New Zealand. The programme delivered into an area with a high Pasifika population resulting in over 120 new Pasifika badminton participants. This programme will continue to grow in 2023 with the aim being to connect these players with the badminton programme in their home countries.



The TIER 3 programme had delivery into the Northern Marianas and Guam in the months prior to the Pacific Mini Games. Both countries have continued with an in-country training programme for their U15's players in the build up towards the 2023 U15 Pacific Invitation Challenge.

As part of the TIER 2 Player Development programme Tahiti was supported to play in the World Junior Championships in Spain where they were joined by Australia as the two representative countries from Oceania. Australia finished 19th out of 38 countries in the team event with Tahiti placed 35th. Tahiti, New Caledonia, and Cook Islands were supported with incountry training programmes as they build-up to the VICTOR Oceania Junior Championships in 2023. With travel open, junior players from the Cook Islands travelled to New Zealand on several occasions where they took part in training camps and competed in local junior tournaments to gain experience. This complemented the in-country training programme which has been built up over the past 8 years.

In TIER 1 the plan was to provide a competition between Australia and New Zealand as a lead in to international play; resulting in the Trans-Tasman Challenge which was a best of 3 test match series for u19 players. Whilst there were some closely contested ties, Australia won the series 3–0. The test



series was followed by a combined training camp and then the players played in the Sydney International tournament.

The Oceania representatives for the TotalEnergies BWF Thomas and Uber Cup Finals were determined based on world ranking as our team competition could not go ahead. New Zealand received the Thomas Cup invitation and Australia the Uber Cup one. Unfortunately for New Zealand several members of their team contracted COVID-19 the week prior when at the Oceania Championships meaning they had to withdraw, leaving Australia as our only representatives in the Uber Cup where they lost both of their ties in group play; not before a good win in the second women's doubles match against Spain by Kaitlyn Ea and Angela Yu both previously on our player development programme.

BWF player scholarships were awarded to 3 players; Shaunna Li (NZL), Edward Lau (NZL) and Remi Rossi (TAH) who trained at the Badminton Europe Centre of Excellence in Denmark and competed in some European grade 3 tournaments. These players then returned to play in the Grade 3 tournaments in the Oceania in October.

To finish the year training scholarships were awarded to the winners of the Oceania Tour to assist them with their training and tournaments in 2023. The winners were:

2023 is looking very positive with the VICTOR Oceania Championships including junior and open, team and individual events, in February.

Thank you to all of the dedicated coaches and administrators who work hard to give our players opportunities and experiences to be better badminton players.

COACH EDUCATION

Coach Education in 2022 saw the return of face to face courses which are an essential part of gaining coaching qualifications and experience.

Face to face courses for Pacific Foundation Coach course were held in the Cook Islands, Fiji, Tahiti and PNG with 43 coaches gaining their first coach qualification. This qualification set new coaches on the pathway working towards attending a BWF Level 1 coach course in the upcoming years. The courses in Cook Islands and Fiji were linked with Player Development programmes which gave the new coaches the opportunity to observe and participate in practical coaching with players from their own country.

There were 5 BWF Level 1 Coach courses completed in 2022; 4 in Australia and 1 in New Zealand, with 46 new coaches achieving this qualification.

2022 saw us continue to stay in close contact with our MA's and coaches via online platforms. Lead Pacific MA coaches continued to have individual support via zoom to assist with their plans and programmes. 25 new coaches undertook the Pacific Foundation course online via the Thinkific platform as they prepare for a future face to face course and start working with young players in-country.

Originally planned for 2020 the BWF Level 1
Tutor and Level 2 Coach courses were able to
go ahead in Melbourne. Six new Tutors were
qualified from Australia while 13 new BWF
Level 2 coaches were qualified from Australia
(9) and New Zealand (4). These courses were
led by BWF Coach Education Specialist; Martin
Andrew who was assisted by BOC Coaching
& Development Manager Robbie Thackham.
The next step in 2023 is for the newly qualified
Tutors to work alongside an experienced Tutor
before being sole charge of a course.

Two BWF Disability Module 13 Coach courses were delivered in Australia by our Coaching and Development Officer; Ian Bridge with 10 coaches gaining this qualification. These courses were held in Melbourne and Sydney giving already qualified BWF Level 1 coaches specialist knowledge in the disability area.

2022 was another good year of progress in the disability area, starting the year off on a high note as we signed a MOU with Special Olympics Asia Pacific for another 3 years to work in collaboration to deliver programmes and provide opportunities to players with intellectual disabilities throughout the region. It is very exciting that we will be represented at the Special Olympics World Games in Berlin in 2023 by two players from both PNG and Fiji.

Two visits were made to Papua New Guinea during the year where we continued to support the development of badminton through the GYMBAD Team Up programme delivering sessions to children with disabilities, para badminton players and upskilling coaches. The World Games pledge between Badminton PNG and Special Olympics PNG was signed by both parties in June as planning and training commences as a build up to the Games next year.

Our staff also visited Fiji where the para badminton sessions were delivered as well as meeting with relevant stakeholders in country with a goal of expanding this programme in Fiji. We also attended school sessions where badminton was being delivered to children with intellectual disabilities in preparation for the Special Olympics World Games 2023.

The BWF Disability Coaching Module 13 was delivered in Sydney, Australia to 6 coaches from New Zealand and Australia. This was followed by a second course in Melbourne; a live-in course which was combined with a Para badminton training camp, a first for this region with both players and coaches finding it very beneficial; particularly the coaches as they gained greater insight into the life of a para badminton player.

We continued to work with Badminton Victoria, implementing recommendations from previous years' work on the 'Melbourne project'. It is pleasing to report that numbers; players, coaches and clubs in this area have continued to grow. New programs have been established and we look forward to seeing further progress in 2023. The VICTOR Oceania Para Badminton Championships were held in Melbourne, Australia in July attracting a record fiftyone entries from 3 countries participated: Australia, New Zealand, and Papua New Guinea. This was a stand-alone

event, delivered to a high level, which

was appreciated by the players who demonstrated just how much the sport has evolved over the last four years with some excellent matches. We look forward to hosting the Western Australia Para Badminton International in Perth next year where we will see some of the world's top players playing.

In conjunction with the VICTOR Oceania Para Badminton Championships, we ran a training camp for the 3 players from PNG who had received support from the Australian Government through their Aid programme to play in this event. A BWF Level 1 Classification Course was held, attended by 7 people from 4 MA's including 2 from our region. This is an excellent course to both start the pathway to becoming and international classifier but also for coaches and administrators to gain knowledge and insight into the classification system. The tournament Referee: Carmen Martinez ran an excellent practical and informative workshop for umpires prior to the tournament and continued to provide feedback for the duration of the Championships.

During the year we had several players play in international para badminton tournaments throughout the world including Thailand, Indonesia, Bahrain, Dubai, and the World Championships in Japan where there were 13 players from the region competing: NZL-2, AUS-11. The highlight of the year was winning 5 medals at the FOX'S Indonesia Para Badminton International:

GENDER EQUITY



FINANCIAL REPORT

Continued good financial management and favourable exchange rates contributed to a higher than budgeted surplus for the year, where we saw a return to pre-COVID funding from the BWF and our expenses associated with programmes and activities also return to pre-COVID levels.

From starting the year with an approved budget surplus of \$604 we returned a surplus of \$60.398


This was achieved as follows:

• The budget was conservative with regards to the exchange rate resulting in \$22,600 of additional operational expenses we could include as part of the BWF Base grant

- New external funding secured from OSFO/ONOC, Tu Manawa Active Aotearoa and GHD for various programmes of \$37,000
- An increased management fee of \$7,778 over budget was received through the TEAM UP programme

As per our reserves policy \$30,200 will be added to our general reserves. In May 2022 \$17,960 was added to our general reserves fund, as per our policy of 50% of the 2021 surplus. The Executive Board approved an additional \$10,000 to be added to our reserves for special projects. Our reserves are steadily increasing to giving us a greater level of comfort for the unexpected occurrences in the future.

Statement of Accounting Policies

Badminton Oceania Confederation (INC) For the year ended 31 December 2022

REPORTING ENTITY

Badminton Oceania Confederation (INC) is an incorporated society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

The Society is a Not-For-Profit organisation that promotes Badminton as a sport for people of all ages and all abilities.

The special purpose financial report was authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the Executive dated 13 April 2023

BASIS OF PREPARATION

This financial report is a special purpose report to explain Badminton Oceania Confederation (INC) 's financial performance and financial position to the members of the society. It is based on accounting principles commonly used in New Zealand as detailed below. The report should not be used for any other purpose.

HISTORICAL COST

These special purpose financial statements have been specifically prepared on a historical cost basis, as identified in the specific accounting policies below. The special purpose financial statements are presented in New Zealand (NZ\$) and all values are rounded to the nearest dollar.

Exceptional Items

Exceptional items are large revenue and/or expense items that do not arise as a result of normal business operations and are not expected to recur. Exceptional items are disclosed in the Statement of Financial Performance where the total value exceeds 5 per cent of revenue.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the Society and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received.

The following specific recognition criteria must be met before revenue is recognised.

Donations, fundraising and other similar revenue

Donations are recognised as revenue upon receipt.

Grant revenue includes grants given by the Badminton World Federation. Grant revenue is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attaching to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to income as the conditions are fulfilled.

Revenue from providing Goods and Services

The Society receives revenue from team events and special projects within the Oceania region. Revenue is recognised in the period the goods and services are provided.

Interest Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised as it accrues, using the effective interest method.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts Receivable are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less an allowance for any uncollectible amounts. Individual debts that are known to be uncollectible are written off in the period that they are identified.

Statement of Accounting Policies

Foreign Currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are converted at the New Zealand rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. At balance date, foreign monetary assets and liabilities are translated at the closing rate, and variations arising from these transactions are included in the Statement of Financial Performance.

Amounts held in foreign currency at balance date are shown at the NZD spot rate for that currency.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Property Plant and Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation is charged on a diminishing value basis over the useful life of the asset, except for land. Land is not depreciated.

Depreciation is charged at rates calculated to allocate the cost or valuation of the asset less any estimated residual value over its remaining useful life:-

Computer Equipment 40% Cost Furniture & Fittings 20% Cost

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and are adjusted if there is a change in the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits or service potential embodied in the asset. An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gains or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised.

Income Tax

The Society is approved as an amateur sports promoter and is therefore exempt from income tax under the Income Tax Act 2007.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Employee Entitlements

Provision has been made for Badminton Oceania Confederation (INC)'s liability for annual leave. The annual leave provision has been calculated on an actual accumulated entitlement basis at current rates of pay. This equates to the cash amount necessary to settle the obligation as at balance date.

Leases

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Operating Leases

Operating lease payments, where the lessors effectively retain substantially all the risk and benefits of ownership of the leased items, are recognised as an expense in the profit and loss on a straight line basis over the lease term. Operating lease incentives are recognised as a liability when received and subsequently reduced by allocating lease payments between rental expense and reduction in liability.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a basis consistent with those of the previous period. Certain presentation changes have been made from last year to fulfill the presentation and disclosure requirements of this framework.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Report on the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of the Badminton Oceania Confederation Incorporated ("The Confederation") on pages 1 to 14, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2022, the statement of financial performance, statement of movements in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, the statement of accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion, the financial statements on pages 1 to 14 present fairly, in all material respects in accordance with the special purpose framework described in the basis of preparation to explain the society's financial performance and financial position to the members of the society based on accounting principles commonly used in New Zealand.

Basis for Opinion

Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Executive's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Executive is responsible for determining that the special purpose framework described in the basis of preparation, based on accounting principles commonly used in New Zealand is acceptable in the Confederation's circumstances, for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the special purpose framework chosen to explain the society's financial performance and financial position to the members of the society and for such internal control as the Executive determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.
